


The theme for 2024

In recognition of the pivotal role that youth can play in addressing challenges bees and other pollinators are facing, **World Bee Day 2024** focuses on the theme "**Bee engaged with Youth.**" This theme highlights the importance of involving young people in beekeeping and pollinator conservation efforts, recognizing them as the future stewards of our environment.

This year's campaign aims to raise awareness among youth and other stakeholders about the essential role of bees and other pollinators in agriculture, ecological balance, and biodiversity preservation. By engaging young people in beekeeping activities, educational initiatives, and advocacy efforts, we can inspire a new generation of environmental leaders and empower them to make a positive impact on the world.

The celebrations for **World Bee Day 2024** will include a global outreach campaign and an in person event, bringing together high-level guests, beekeeping experts, and youth participants from around the world. This campaign will provide a platform for dialogue, collaboration, and knowledge-sharing, fostering intergenerational exchange and inspiring action towards a more sustainable future for bees and other pollinators.





Calls to actions

All of us

Join the buzz for World Bee Day 2024! Spread awareness about the importance of bees and other pollinators among friends, family, and the community.

• Foster an environment that supports, encourages and empowers youth in sustainable beekeeping and bee-friendly initiatives.

Youth

- Take the lead in sustainable beekeeping and pollinator conservation efforts in your community. Get involved, learn, and inspire others to join the cause.
- Engage in mentorship programs and seek guidance from experienced beekeepers to develop your skills and make a meaningful impact in beekeeping.

Experienced beekeepers

- Mentor and empower young beekeepers by sharing your expertise and providing opportunities for hands-on learning and skill development.
- Collaborate with youth-led initiatives and organizations to amplify their voices and support their efforts in beekeeping and pollinator conservation.

Governments

- Reaffirm youth involvement in beekeeping and sustainable agricultural practices to address the impact on food security.
- Develop pollinator-friendly policies in collaboration with youth representatives that specifically encourage and support young beekeepers, considering their role as future stewards of the environment.





Private sector

- Partner with youth-led organizations and initiatives to support sustainable beekeeping and pollinator conservation efforts.
 Provide funding, resources, and expertise to empower young people to make a difference.
- Invest in apprenticeship programs, internships, and job opportunities for young people interested in beekeeping and related fields, helping to build a sustainable future for beekeeping and agriculture.

Civil society organizations (CSOs)

- Advocate for policies that recognize and promote the critical role of young beekeepers in maintaining healthy ecosystems and combating food insecurity.
- Facilitate dialogue and collaboration between young beekeepers, farmers, and other stakeholders to ensure a sustainable future for beekeeping.

Research and scientific community

- Develop and implement field- and landscape-level protection mechanisms with a focus on youth engagement.
- Collaborate with youth researchers and organizations to address key challenges for sustainable beekeeping and pollinator conservation through research and innovative solutions.

Urban dwellers and beekeepers

- Promote awareness among urban youth about the vital role of bees, butterflies and other pollinators in their environment and food security.
- Raise awareness of the important role that pollinator-friendly practices and plant selection in gardens, terraces and balconies can play in improving pollinator habitat in the urban environment.

Consumers

- Educate the younger generations about the importance of their choices in supporting sustainable agriculture and beekeeping practices.
- Encourage consumers to choose organic and locally grown products, support pollinator-friendly labels, and actively participate in planting pollinator-friendly gardens.



How to participate

Get involved in one of the following ways and encourage your network to do so!

Bring world bee day to your own town or city.

Pro-bono advertising is a great way to increase the impact of World Bee Day even beyond 20 May – pollinators play a vital role in protecting ecosystem health and food security. Approach municipalities, outdoor advertisers, transportation companies, such as city metro, buses or trains, shopping malls, cinemas or airports now to display the World Bee Day poster.

Community or school initiative.

Start an initiative in a community or school garden to teach young people about the benefits of pollinators and what healthy pollinator-habitats look like. Learning how to protect pollinators through ecosystem-friendly practices (plant diversity, integrated pest management) supports the environment and helps boost food security.

Honey tasting.

To celebrate World Bee Day why not organize a honey tasting session with your friends and family? Can you tell the difference between honeys produced from different plants visited by the bees? Which is your favorite? Can't meet in person? Don't worry, you can even find virtual honey tasting sessions online!

Organize a world bee day event.

Embrace creativity by exploring various activities and innovative event formats. Consider digital platforms or alternative approaches to ensure inclusivity and engagement. From online discussions to interactive workshops, there are countless ways to celebrate and advocate for bees.



Parks and gardens.

If you enjoy a walk in the park or garden, why not make your local town or municipality aware of World Bee Day? Many of the plants and trees in the beautiful parks and gardens around the world would not exist without our pollinators.

Spread the word.

Inform, educate and engage audiences with real facts. Join the **#WorldBeeDay** campaign by sharing our free material on digital channels. Identify and engage with local and national digital influencers in the food and development sector (bloggers, actors, popular public figures, photographers and experts) to amplify our messages around sustainable beekeeping.

Add the world bee day button to your website.

Mark the day by including the World Bee Day button on your website a week or two before 20 May and get people talking about bees and other pollinators. Using a visual, such as the button is a great way to increase interest and awareness about the day and show your support.

Plant Bee-friendly gardens

- Choose native plants and attractive crops that provide food for bees.
- Include a variety of flowers that bloom at different times of the year.

Support local Beekeepers

- Buy honey and other bee products from local beekeepers.
- Learn more about beekeeping and your local products.

Create Bee habitats

- Set up bee houses or nesting sites for solitary bees.
- Create hedgerows and leave nesting sites and patches of bare ground for ground-nesting bees.

Avoid chemical use that can harm Bees

- Reduce or change the usage of pesticides and fertilizers.
- Choose organic and sustainable food options.

Learn about Bee species

- Explore the different types of bees in your area.
- Understand their habitats and needs for survival.
